#### A WORD FROM AAG PRESIDENT, DAVID L. BRADLEY .....



Creativity is our core ability, as artists. If we are to be successful artists, we must exercise our creative muscle. As individuals, we have autonomy to make decisions in our studios, or on canvas, etc. to do whatever we can imagine. Working in my studio, my creativity is like sitting down to a meal of one flavor, like a chunk of steak, or a serving of broccoli. It's one note, one idea

defined by, and limited to, my own experience and perspective. However, when collaborating with others, it is more akin to sitting down to a meal with multiple flavors mingled together in every bite, like in a stew, or salad. There is more satisfaction, more stimulation, more possibility. So, how can that be replicated in our art practice? Tess and I just watched the Beatles documentary, "Get Back" on Disney+. This documentary covers a 30 day period in 1969 when the Beatles gathered after a long hiatus to create an album of songs. It is fascinating to watch them get comfortable with each other again, and begin the process of fleshing out songs they have written, but none of which were finished. One would sing a couple of lines and the others would suggest lines to continue the story. The documentary shows how many different versions they tried out of all the songs that ended up on the album "Let it Be". It took a lot of trust in each other to be able to do that. They had been together for 10 years, and reached the highest pinnacle of their profession as musicians and performers.

If you ever want to witness the creative process in action, watch this documentary. You will witness how playful they were with their instruments and their skills. The playfulness resulted in discoveries in sounds and rhythms that were and are unique. They experimented with their voices, their instruments, their timing and rhythm. All the while, being open to what the others were doing, without judgment, being open to new sounds, ideas or interpretations. The aspect of "play" as it relates to creativity is important as well because it is through play that new creative discoveries emerge.

Playfulness is only one half of their equation, collaboration is the other. I have taken part in many collaborative projects over the years and every one of them has resulted in more than the sum of their parts. In public art projects, an artist has to work with input from a wide variety of stakeholders: the public, the funder(s), engineers who must make sure the finished work will last and be easily maintained; assistants with varying degrees of skill and experience, who may or may not be compensated. All contributing to the project in ways that must be considered by the artist. Having been in that position many times over my career, I know that if I wanted the project to move forward and fulfill all expectations, I would have to keep an open mind, and not reject suggestions out of hand without careful consideration. I would have to trust that the other stakeholders' perspectives have the best intentions for the project, and I would have to give up total control over the project outcomes. Every work of public art you have ever seen is the result of compromise and collaboration. Some may see compromise as an unacceptable outcome that means the result is a "watered down" version of the work, but I see compromise as a necessary aspect of creativity. We have to make our ideas work with others and for others if we want it to be widely accepted and appreciated.

Look for opportunities to collaborate with another artist, or group of artists. Try to find your Paul McCartney, or John Lennon, someone who knows you better than anyone else, and who you can trust with your most personal expressions. When you have that you will have an opportunity to move beyond your wildest dreams of possibility for creation.

#### VETERANS CERAMICS PROGRAM

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## WHAT DOES ART MEAN TO YOU?



For me, it was a way to self-validate. If I could create a landscape with good composition and bright colors, then it showed that I had value as a person. I had doubts about self-worth after being divorced after a long marriage. Finishing a painting, I

would think "wow, I did that!" But after doing art for years, I wanted to meet people that could provide feedback to bring my paintings up to a higher level. Also, feeling isolated, the opportunity for social interaction was something that I was seeking. Creating art by myself is rewarding, but it's more fun if it is shared.

When I joined the community of artists at AAG, the exposure to different styles and perspectives was a learning experience that I could apply to my own work. Workshops and lectures provided new techniques. Critiques from experienced artists showed ways that I could improve a painting. Networking with people about materials sparked experiments with unexpected results that were good, bad, or indifferent, but it didn't matter. It was the fun of doing something new. I also got the chance to be in exhibitions, which gave me confidence.

With all of the benefits of membership, there has to be some place to do activities. AAG bought the building twelve years ago. It's a place to have meetings, workshops, life drawing, critiques, exhibitions and meetings for other arts organizations and Outreach. On average, with utilities, landscaping, garbage, cleaning, supplies, repairs, security and insurance, the building costs about \$18,000 a year to maintain.

With the building age comes repairs. The refrigerator died and the hot water heater had to be replaced this year. The air conditioning will cost \$28,000 to fix. As a nonprofit, AAG isn't always able to generate enough income to cover expenses. The pandemic cut off fund raising events like Artstravaganza and organizations that rented the building decided not to meet. Memberships dropped, which also provided income.

If you like the activities we do and enjoy socializing with other artists, consider donating any amount. It's tax deductible and much appreciated—especially next summer when it's 110 degrees. The new air conditioning will feel fabulous.

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

Here, he constructed a new studio space from metal shipping containers and through this process became fascinated with metal as a medium. Jim combines clay and metal in sculpture that reflect a connection to the natural world and the history of art and artifacts across cultures. He draws inspiration from the desert landscape as well as his love of the forms, symbols, and architecture of the ancient world. Clay and metal are primitive; they tell the stories of our past. They are the raw materials taken from our natural world and transformed through the processes of heat and pressure. They have a permanence that challenges our modern, technology-driven life.

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
