Meet the Artist

Cynthia Dunn-Selph, AAG's newest director, is a mixed media artist and photographer that is retired and living with her husband in Sun City with their three cats. She is the proud mom of a great son, who also is an artist and a musician, and he is getting married in the spring. Cynthia is the first person to be featured in Meet the Artist.



What do you create? I play with every medium, but my current focus is encaustic painting (technique in which pigments are mixed with hot liquid beeswax and damar resin), collage, and monoprinting.

What inspired you to become an artist? Both of my parents were artists, so I don't think I had a choice as art has always been a part of my life. I received my first camera when I was 10 years old and have been taking pictures ever since, with experience in the old fashioned darkroom too. Now, with smart phones, everyone is a photographer, so I was drawn to the encaustic medium as a way to take my photos to another level. The look and feel of beeswax is like nothing else and I am loving my exploration of the medium, which has gone way past photo encaustic. How do you hope to grow your art career this year? I'm looking forward to meeting and learning from other artists. I plan on challenging myself to explore mediums and styles that I'm not comfortable with and then hopefully, incorporate into my work.

What is the biggest challenge of creating your artwork? To be okay with work that I consider unsuccessful; to learn from what didn't work and try again.

What other activities do you enjoy? I enjoy teaching, especially being able to introduce something new to someone, or a new way of working with a medium. I love seeing those "aha" moments. I also run a postcard exchange group on Facebook that is great fun.

What is your No. 1 suggestion to new artists? Try everything. When you see something you like, study how the artist did it, try to duplicate it, try doing it another way, try doing it in another medium. Be open to experimenting and let go of it needing to be perfect.

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Professional Tip of the Month

The Business of Art is uncomfortable and often unfamiliar. Artists would rather be making art than anything else. This page is devoted to tips for running your art business. Whether you are new to the art world or a seasoned artist you will find many of the ideas shared here helpful, informative or perhaps they act as a reminder of what you need to do.

Writing your Artists Statement by H.E.A.R.T.

Writing an artist statement can be a daunting task. Knowing what to say about your work, your process, and your expression is not always easy and generally does not come naturally to most artists.

Every artist has a story to tell. What is your story? What story are you telling in your work? It is imperative to take time to reflect on your art-making practice. This is an opportunity to see yourself from a different perspective, to open your narrative and broaden the conversation between yourself, your work, and your audience. Your art practice is not just about the act of making art. It is important to articulate what motivates you, what inspires you and how, in turn, your work touches others. The artist statement is your opportunity to create a narrative around your art, your style and artistic practice.

To do this, you have to be willing to take a deep and honest look at yourself, your practice, and your art. The artist statement should include the following:

- **History:** identify the significant aspects of your personal history that informs your art or identity as an artist
- **Emotions:** realize the emotional response evoked by your work
- Aesthetic: look for a new way to understand your artistic process and aesthetic; learn to articulate the aesthetics of the work
- **Reasons:** understand your personal reasons for doing the work
- **Technique:** think about yourself, your art and your art making practice in a new way
- Themes: identify a common thread or theme in your work/body of work

Over and over, I hear artists say that they are not sure what to say when someone asks about their work. Because of this, I have compiled a list of questions to help artists move beyond the quicksand. See the January issue for the list of questions.

If you are actively engaged in making and showing your work, you should be writing a general artist statement, statements for each series, theme or body of work, and for the important or pivotal pieces.

TIPS:

1. Your artist statement should be clear, concise, and to the point.

2. Your artist statement should explain what your work is about, what inspires you, and what message you are trying to convey. Be specific and its ok to use concrete examples.


3. Your artist statement should reflect your personality, your passion, and your unique perspective.

4. Write in the First Person: Use your own voice but use your professional voice.

Edit and revise: Go over it with a fine-tooth comb. Ask trusted friends, family, or colleagues to read your statement and provide feedback. This will help ensure that your statement is clear, concise, and effective without spelling or grammatical errors.

Remember that your artist statement is an important part of your overall brand and should reflect your style, vision, and values. Take the time to craft a statement/s that accurately represents who you are and what you stand for as an artist.

Know Your Black Pigments

- Mars Black (also Black Iron Oxide) is considered the most non-toxic black paint and/is opaque and fast drying. It has a slight warm tint but is considered more of a neutral black, which means it is good for mixing and does not appear too blue or too brown.
- Lamp Black or Carbon Black is the strongest black and has a slightly cool undertone. It is the most transparent of the blacks and appears quite blue.
- **Bone Black**, an ancient color, is formed from the burning bones where impurities provide a slightly warmer undertone.
- **Ivory Black** it is made from the dry distillation of degreased animal bones and has a warm brownish tint.
- Attrament black has a greenish warm tint.
- Asphaltum or Gilsonit pigment is otherwise known as bitumen. It's a transparent, brown-black brown mineral pigment used in glazes for depth and warmth.


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
